

CUSTOMIZING THE TEI

- The TEI is capacious.
- No project uses all 500+ elements
- Schema customization is the way to keep your data from chaos.
- Tomorrow we will work through some project considerations – the first step towards deciding which parts of the TEI might be useful to you.



TEI IN ACTION

Before we turn to what projects are doing with their TEI, let's have a look at a simple sample file, a file with a full header, and a file with a customized schema.


TEI-BASED PROJECTS: THE MAP OF EARLY MODERN LONDON







May * Vancouver * After a 5–5 tie vote, Vancouver City Council rejected a grant proposal for \$9,000 to sponsor a gay education and counselling service, submitted by SEARCH. 

GATE (Toronto) protested to OECA chairperson Ronald Ide, and demanded that the program be withdrawn and never shown again. Later, members of *The Body Politic*, GATE (Toronto), and GAY met with the head of adult programming for OECA in an attempt to influence programming on gay subjects.







Project development is iterative. Scale the scope and size of each project phase to the amount of time and money you have.

In 2012

- People: 2 (cooks, waiters, bottle washers)
- Tech: The Oxygen XML Editor & Dropbox

In 2015

- People: 2 Pls, 3 collaborators, 5 RAs
- Support: SSHRC, CFI, WestGrid, Ryerson Centre for Digital Humanities, UBCO Faculty of Creative and Critical Studies, UBCO IT, UBCO's Work/Study program.
- Tech: Redmine for project management, WestGrid OwnCloud for file sharing, WestGrid Virtual Machines for development, Oxygen XML Editor, Keyboard Maestro, Excel, Neo4j Database, Javascript libraries.

TURNING PLANNING INTO A GRANT APPLICATION & WORK PLAN

Answer the questions on project considerations pdf, consulting as you go (who knows best what kind of technical resources you will need? Does your library archive projects? Under which conditions?)

Convert your answers into discrete tasks (including learning). Noting their dependencies, put the tasks on post-it notes. Placing the post-it notes in order on a wall to show yourself what you need to do first.

Sketch out (or post-it note out) two versions of the project:

- The no-funding-but-I-will-do-it-anyway-because-I-love-it-so-much or MVP (minimum viable product) version
- The fully-funded version

Get started on the MVP version (working on the MVP includes learning. On the tech front, you will develop a new tolerance for frustration). Take advantage of the resources available to you (collective lab space, file sharing and file transfer from WestGrid, consultation with librarians etc).

Write the grant application, highlighting how your project meets the funder's needs (will it employ many students? Foster international collaboration? Shed light on an under-studied phenomenon?) and highlighting the MVP's progress.
